community. After weeks of preparation in CAP Senior Seminar (taught by Mr. Grossman and Ms. Russell), students presented 12–15 minute projects that touched on both personal achievements and skills gained throughout each student's three and a half years in CAP.

During the course of two school days, students from all grades of CAP joined together to watch over 70 seniors present. From baseball to mountain climbing, seniors touched on a number of impressive hobbies and interests in their culminating presentations. Similar to previous years, each presentation was graded by a team of two CAP teachers who were given a rubric designed to evaluate all aspects of the oral and visual display, including delivery, graphics, and written content. Overall, the project was a huge success with over 97% of the senior class passing the assignment on their first try.

researched and analyzed significant events during the decade and crafted creative radio shows covering their topics. Dr. Simel's English rotation researched influential places and figures that existed during the period's Harlem Renaissance and proceeded to create travel brochures of Upper Manhattan as well as act out famous characters from the era.

Mr. Bustillos' photography rotation used Photoshop to create comic book-style stories of events from the 1920s, while Mrs. Jeral's theater group explored the artistic elements of the era with performances of lively scenes, songs and dances from the Harlem Renaissance and European Theater of the Absurd. At the end of the week, students showcased their projects in an elegant, Savoy Ballroom-themed celebration with food, music, and lively entertainment!



Sophomores debate policy topics

At the beginning of the second quarter, CAP sophomores participated in their second large interdisciplinary project—CAP Debates. For this project, students chose to argue the affirmative or negative side of a proposition, with topics ranging from social media regulation and raising the national minimum wage to gender quotas in elections and the use of unmanned drones in Amazon deliveries. The debates aimed to strengthen students' public speaking and persuasion skills. Students were able to both develop positions on key public policy issues and hone their ability to communicate them effectively.

After reading the novel Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close, by Jonathan Safran Foer, 10th grade students were tasked with creating a multimedia presentation designed to reveal personal connections to the book and help students develop a specific voice. Being a very open ended project, students were able to personalize the content and make it their own, with topics covering everything from the loss of a mother to a humorous connection between the main character's mind and a student's own ADHD. Students appreciated the personal touches of each project and enjoyed watching the work of their peers
